Sam Houston W. Danny Davis (Sam is very "over" here and drew a lot of face heat. He took a great bump over the top rope and executed a great reverse suplex. End came when Danny attempted a pin and the referee stopped the count because Sam's foot was on the ropes. Danny throught he won and his hands in victory. Sam then snuck-up behind the "worlds greatest referee" and rolled him up for the pin.)

The One Man Gang C.O.R. Jake Roberts (The Snake and The DDT are over very big in L.A. A lot of crowd reaction especially calling for the DDT. OMG's looking more and more like Adrian Adonis. He managed to escape from the DDT a few times with the help of the ropes and Slick. Jake ran a series of 3 left jabs and a right that would make Larry Holmes proud. Slick was very effective getting chased. He managed to stay away from Jake long enough for the Snake to be counted out. Jake got his revenge, though, as both heels got a dose to Damien.)

The Jumping Bomb Angels W. The Glamour Girls (An excellent show put on by The Angels. Some of the flying moves were actually breath taking. Action all the way. Please don't go home Angels. End came with Lei Lani Kai getting pinned by a combination flying head scissors rollup.

Ted DiBiase W. Bam Bam Bigelow (And they said The W.W.F. wasn't capable of an "A" match. This one had great heat, great action, great bumps, great match. I crowd noise was "Hoganesque" and in front of the smallest crowd in years. Ted got the pin after Virgil creamed him with the championship belt.)

Danny Spivey W. Lanny Poffo (A total waste of time. Not a peep from the audience especially coming off the intermission. Spivey looked good coming in with his current haircut (Short on top and long in th back) but it soon became obvious that both guys had the night off. Dan won with a power slam.)

Brutus Beefcake W. Greg Valentine (Typical bout with the usual Valentine prat falls. The end was done fairly well and it was a surprise. Greg looked like he got the pin but both men had their shoulders on the mat and evidently Brutus picked his shoulder up in time for the referee to 3-count Greg.)

The Islanders W. The British Bulldogs -DQ. (This was also a typical bout with the quality being above avarage. A lot of action, and crowd noise. The Islanders used the dog strap to torment The Bulldogs and later on, began using it on them. Dynamite shoved the referee aside in order to get his revenge. The referee had no choice but to award the bout to Tama & Haku.)

Notes:

Aside from a couple of turkeys, this was an outstanding card. The turnout was real surprising as I had assumed that there would be a large walk-up attendance as a carry over from Friday the 5th. Just the opposite took place, they missed one of the best bouts in years. The crowd was very loud. Ted was announced as The New W.W.F. Heaveyweight Champion and had the belt to prove it. The noise was so loud when he took the microphone that we couldn't make out what he was saying. This is amazing since there was only 3,000 in a building with a capacity of 14,500. He said some things like he told us so and he did it. Also we weren't going to get any money from him that night. Bam Bam looked great and showed no

signs of any knee problems, especially the right one as he gave it a good shot

with Ted's rear end and he didn't flinch.

Attendance of the show was 3201. The gate for that evening was \$32,746.

The Big Green Machine pinned The Italian Stallion at 6:00 (D-) The first match started on time tonight. I heard that promoter Elliot Murnick was fuming about the \$500 fine he had to pay for starting late on 1/29/88 and for allowing Earl Hebner officiate the main event matches. I have no clues as to who The Big Green Machine is. I don't think it was Bugsy McGraw. I couldn't believe that The Stallion lost. Here's a guy that could become popular in the ethnic cities like Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Cleveland. Mostly The Stallion got pummeled shots to the head at the corner and flung him to the opposite turnbuckle for another 10 blows. The Stallion went off the second ropes but missed Greenie at 5:40. Greenie got up and delivered 10 elbow drops onto The Stallion for the uneventful pin and ending.

Jimmy Valiant pinned Jimmy "Stonewall" Jackson at 2:34 with a powerful bionic elbow. (F) Valiant teased Jackson with his test of strenght routine by switching hands and then throwing the finger at Jackson. I think it's a cheap way of getting laughs. They didn't lock up until 1:45. End came when Valiant threw Jackson into the ropes and delivered a elbow that Ole Dusty would have been proud of to get the pin.

Chris Champion pinned Shaska Whatley at 7:31 with a sunset flip from outside the ring. (D) Another disappointing match. Help: Bring back The W.W.F.: I though this match had some possibilities. Champion looks good and seems to have added some weight and was not wearing his cast. At :55 Champion gave Shaska a hip toss and bodyslam and Shaska quickly scooted outside the ring. A fan started to heckle Shaska and Shaska came back with: "Why don't you come up here and wrestle your damm self?" Champion delivered some nice high leg bombs at 2:40 and Shaska exited the ring again. At 3:42 Shaska nailed Champion with an atomic drop. It was mostly Shaska for the balance of the match with his headbutts and elbow drops. Shaska threw out Champion at 6:20 and Shaska went out and beat up on Champion a bit. Ivan proceeded to get at least three or four 2 counts on Santana and threw him outside the ring. Santana got back in at 10:33 and did the sunset flip routine on Ivan but Ivan kicked out. Ivan took the upper hand for the next 6 minutes getting many 2 counts using the ropes. This was all action and offense by Ivan. At 17:25 Santana reversed a suplex by Ivan and gave him one of his own. The Lightning Express beat The Sheepherders with Johnny Ace at 12:48. Tim Horner pinned Luke Williams (B) Best match of the night. These two teams were not as sharp as their Columbus match last year but still it was exciting. These two teams are as exciting as Rock n. Roll vs Midnite Express or Bulldogs vs Hart Foundation. Solid action. Lots of antics with The New Zealand flag before the bell. A very nice beginning as The Lighting Express attacked The Sheeps during the final flag salute. The Sheeps recovered and threw Horner & Armstrong into each other but they did a do-see-do and popped each Sheep with a dropkick at :30. It was mostly The Lightning Express for the first 6½ minutes with their perfectly timed double dropkicks. Butch Miller tripped Horner as he went to the ropes and The Sheeps took comand. Luke Williams missed a diving headbutt on Horner enabling him to tag in Armstrong at 11:39. Mass mayhem ensued as Johnny Ace got involved and Miller used the flagpole on Armstrong. The Road Warriors with Paul Ellering beat The Powers Of Pain with Paul Jones & Ivan Koloff at 8:25 in a lumberjack match. Yes, Animal pinned lumberjack Ivan Koloff to get the victory. (C/) I think The Von Erichs and Freebirds got the right idea. If you're going to have a lumberjack match, make it a lumberjack match with straps. The lumberjacks got involved outside the ring but really had very little to do other than stand around. Animal wore a Jason like hockey mask to the ring. It's a good thing because The Barbarian gave him a solid boot to the face at 2:36. Animal got thrown out and the lumberjacks got into it for a for a brief moment. Hawk gave Babarian a clothesline over the top rope; if 5:09 but was not DQed. Babarian looked like he was bleeding but it could have been his war paint getting smeared. Animal gave Babarian a powerslam at 7:43. The match broke down as Hawk and Warlord were fighting among the lumberjacks and Ivan got into the ring with his chains as Babarian held Animal and pulled his mask off. It's Really Got A Hold on Audiences


Wrestling is a hit again, thanks to the antics of the WWF

orld Wrestling Federation head Vince McMahon may just be this generation's P. T. Barnum.

The circus promoter certainly would have envied McMahon's success in packaging collisions of behemoths into enter-

tainment events that have: drawn bigger crowds than Pope John Paul II and the Super Bowl (when each appeared in the Pontiac Silverdome); boosted network and cable TV ratings; and begun to tame the new pay-per-view medium.



In the disputed WWF title match last month, Andre the Giant was encouraged by "Million Dollar Man" Ted DiBiase and his money-counting assistant, Virgil.

McMahon's specialty is professional wrestling, which, thanks largely to his efforts over the past seven years, has rocketed from the bottom of the TV sports barrel — where it lay roughly in parity with roller derby — to campy melodramatic spectaculars that NBC program head Brandon Tartikoff has suggested adding to the network's prime time schedule.

n Feb. 5, the WWF's first foray into prime time — and the sport's first appearance on the networks in that time period in more than 30 years — garnered NBC its highest ratings of the night. In the featured match, the 6-foot-8, 300-pound WWF champ Hulk Hogan lost his belt to the 7-foot-4, 500-pound Andre the Giant, setting the stage for Wrestlemania IV, a four-hour extravaganza taking place at Trump Plaza next Sunday and being beamed to pay-perview cable homes and closed-circuit sites around North America. It will likely be wrestling's greatest payday ever.

The Giant was aided by an evil twin referee who ruled that Hogan was pinned to the canvas, although a midget wrestler could probably have done the limbo between the mat and Hogan's left shoulder. After a melee involving the referee, his twin, Hogan, and Andre's sidemen, the title was declared vacant, and 14 of WWF's top matmen will battle in the March 27 elimination tourna-

ment to claim the belt.

The evil twin referee trick in a sporting event, you say? Hey, we're talking prime time entertainment, where an entire season of "Dallas" turns out to be a dream, and previously unknown siblings pop up on "Dynasty" whenever ratings lag. Whether the outcome of wrestling matches is prearranged is no longer a consideration. Wrestling has mushroomed by moving from sport to entertainment.

Producer Dick Ebersol left "Saturday Night Live" to create NBC's highly rated WWF show, "Saturday Night's Main Event," which airs late-night once a month. He says wrestling has thrived on TV by using TV techniques, including dramatic plot twists.

"McMahon presents his talent the same way Norman Lear presented Archie and Edith, with clear strong characters and story line," said Ebersol, who added that "Main Event" beats his old comedy show consistently in ratings and profitability in first run. WWF isn't the only wrestling alliance trying to use television to build audiences, Ebersol said, but "the others are just a bunch of

neanderthals rolling around on the mat and slicing their heads with razors.'

The WWF is owned by Greenwich, Conn.-based Titan Sports, which rules the wrestling world through a TV empire that includes shows on superstation WWOR/9 and cable's USA Network. Trailing the WWF is the Charlotte, N.C.-based National Wrestling Alliance, which is slowly building its own momentum on superstation TBS and through syndication. The NWA usually restricts the action to the ring. The WWF seems at least as interested in building personalities as in presenting mat maneuvers.

Good against evil has always been wrestling's selling point; you never needed a detective's shield to identify the bad guy. But McMahon, who doubles as the WWF's on-air commentator, took this a step further by allowing his characters to become as well defined as Hulk Hogan's pectorals.

Aside from devoting air time to such plot twists as the evil referee and the kidnapping of managers, McMahon has his wrestlers work overtime to create conflict outside the ring. Mini-documentaries capture them in "real life," and interviews show them threatening their rivals, spitting epithets and boasting of their own personal prowess. McMahon's schlockiest coup to date was to turn his musclebound troops into singers, releasing two "Piledriver" rock music albums. The matches themselves often seem anticlimactic.

"McMahon filled a void for heroes by carefully molding talent into wellformed characters with comedic insight," said Ebersol. "He has 25 stars that are instantly recognizable to 50 percent of a TV audience. There's nothing else around like that." Ebersol said the WWF pours out five hours of new shows weekly "to build those personas."

McMahon, 42, engineered the WWF's rise during the period in which he bought the business from his ailing father, Vince Sr., in the early '80s. The WWF controlled just four eastern states, lagging behind both the NWA and the American Wrestling Alliance.

The promoter went into debt to purchase TV time across the country, and to sign arenas to long-term deals. He staged TV matches with his best wrestlers against faceless stiffs, whose chances of survival matched that of the unknown "Star Trek" cast member beaming down to a hostile planet with Kirk and Spock. After mopping the mat with the losers, the stars would be interviewed by McMahon, building controversy for live events.

He then aligned himself with rock star Cyndi Lauper. Her outrageous per-

And Now: The Mat Maidens

Although the World Wrestling Federation reigns supreme in male pro wrestling, there is a battle underway for the much smaller television turf in the women's field. Their strength is the live arena draw, but you may soon be seeing a bevy of mat maidens flying across your TV screen.

At the recent convention of the National Association of Television Program Executives in Houston, where syndicated shows were sold to stations, no fewer than four alphabet groups were selling TV shows: "GLOW" (Gorgeous Ladies of Wrestling), "POW" (Powerful Women of Wrestling), "WWA" (Women's Wrestling Alliance) and "WWC"

(World Women's Council).

Ladies wrestle periodically within the WWF and NWA, but there, the women warriors seem to rank as high in priority as the mat midgets, who also appear only occasionally. "GLOW," with weekly TV exposure in 80 markets, is currently the biggest full-time women's alliance; taped in Las Vegas, it airs locally Saturday night at 1 a.m. on WPIX/11. "POW," a spinoff of "GLOW," airs on MSG Saturday at 11 p.m. The others have not yet been tele-- Fleming vised.

sona blended perfectly with wrestling's, and her involvement in televised matches on MTV quickly cemented the WWF's status nationally. That led to McMahon's involvement with Ebersol, who was persuaded to take up wrestling by his agent (who also represents McMahon) as he was leaving "SNL."

"I laughed out loud when it was first suggested," said Ebersol, who soon listened as then-MTV head Bob Pittman and David Letterman suggested he give grappling a chance. "I finally made an appointment for McMahon to come see me in the 'Saturday Night Live' office,'' he said, where, after listening to McMahon's vision and grand plans, "we shook hands on the spot."

ccording to Basil DeVito, senior vice president of marketing for WWF parent company Titan Sports, the WWF now stages 1,000 evenings of live wrestling per year in 40 countries (compared to the NWA's 400 cards). Gate receipts supply most of the WWF's profits, and it

is estimated that the WWF brings in \$250 to \$300 million annually.

Wrestlemania III last spring drew more people than the Pope to the Silverdome, setting a world indoor attendance record of 93,173. Wrestlemania IV will be staged in the smaller confines of Trump Plaza in Atlantic City, but sources say that Donald Trump is paying \$1 million for that privilege. The event is expected to better last year's draw of 663,000 pay-per-view (PPV) homes and gross of \$10.3 million, which the National Cable Forum reports is the largest pay-per-view take ever.

McMahon guards that turf jealously: When the rival NWA made its PPV debut with its traditional Thanksgiving card, called Starrcade, McMahon quickly countered by signing up the majority of PPV systems exclusively for his "Survivor Series," a Turkey Day tag team event bought by 500,000 households.

When the NWA tried again, throwing its top stars in the ring together in January's Bunkhouse Stampede, McMahon scheduled a similar event on free cable's USA Network the same night.

Still, the NWA is profitable, having grown 1,500 percent in the last year since moving from regional to national TV coverage, according to vice president of operations David Crockett. He said that in addition to airing its matches on TBS and stations across the country, the NWA is learning the pay-per-view ropes, and has four pay specials scheduled in 1988. (The NWA is countering the payper-view Wrestlemania IV with its Clash of the Champions, presented free on TBS at the same 4 p.m. starting time.) In addition, a sitcom called "Learning The Ropes," starring Lyle Alzado as a moonlighting wrestler and featuring NWA grapplers playing themselves, is being offered in syndication for the fall season.

Ric Flair, who has been NWA champ on and off since 1981, prefers the NWA's no-nonsense philosophy, but admits the WWF's success hasn't hurt his group. "Their hype helps. It brings attention to all of us," said Flair, who estimated that wrestling's total take last year was \$400 million.

Meanwhile, a new subplot is rumored to be in development at the WWF. Hulk Hogan, who in the last five years has become arguably the sport's most popular champion ever, may star in a "Rambo"-like action feature film. Not surprisingly, word on the grappling grapevine is that McMahon will be involved in the financing; the WWF admits there has been movie talk but claims nothing is set. Don't be surprised if McMahon's world of wrestling, which has turned a profit in the media of TV, cable, pay-per-view, recorded music and home video, soon shows up at a movie theater near you.
